This month sees the launch of the exciting new developments of CNI Network.

At the CNI Leadership Group day in April we prayed and talked around CNI Network, the role it plays and the future developments.

The five strand approach (see last months newsletter and web site) has helped us focus and clarify the vision. It was agreed at the AGM that Halifax Street Angels and CNI Network separate to have two distinctive identities and, eventually, become two separate charities.

CNI has, and will continue to, develop ideas such as www.wehelpedu.org.uk which offers practical support to local projects and www.loveyourstreets.org.uk which promotes social community action and engagement. The heartbeat of CNI is

to see people making the difference within the wider community.

CNI has become one of the leading national voices for work within the night-time economy and contributes to Christian community engagement issues generally. All of this celebrates and promotes what God is doing through people in projects the length and breadth of the UK. Paul and Adam are both set to go full time working on CNI (with Paul moving away from Halifax Street Angels) with many other exciting ideas around training centres, flagship events and supporting volunteers and local project needs - please pray as this happens and for finance and that we will continue to see God's Kingdom evidenced in towns and cities at night...



Sarah from Watford Street Angels joined Paul and Jean and Adam and Becky to take **Love Your Streets** to the people of London as part of Pentecost Festival.

The day started at 8.30am with a live radio interview on Premier Christian Radio with Dave Gilpin and Lizzie Crow. The team spoke about the plans for the day and shared some of the stories from CNI linked projects across the UK alongside the story of Street Angels - CNI Network.

The day then moved to Westminster Central Hall where a display was set up as part of a wide range of events. The main focus of the day was handing out sweets and cards to people watching the Trooping of the Colour, in and around Westminster and on the South Bank. Many interesting conversations were had and people from around the world appreciated the Love Your Streets idea and that the church was active celebrating its birthday!

The team then made there way to the O2 Arena for a Pentecost Celebration with 16,000 others. The event was hosted by Share Jesus International, Holy Trinity Brompton, Hillsong and Jesus House.

Sarah said of the day, "It was an amazing day, filled with warmth from both the glorious sunshine and the reactions of the people we spoke to, sharing God's love with". Jean added "It was great to surprise Londoners and visitors with free sweets to help celebrate the birthday of the church - Love Your Streets in action!" We plan to do this again next Pentecost Festival weekend and as part of the Olympics (and possibly over this summer)...

One early evening in May I received a surprise phone call from the Huddersfield Examiner. The young lady said that Huddersfield Street Angels had been nominated for a Huddersfield Examiner Community Award, and that we were in the top three of the section 'Friend of the year Award.'

Vee Travers, Prayer Coordinator of Bedford Street Angels recently attended the **Sharing Hope in Crisis Seminar** - she writes:

Though put on by members of the Billy Graham Rapid Response Team this seminar deals with helping all those going through trauma and grief. To the individual concerned their life has been shattered by the experience. Be it the loss of a loved one, a job, home, relationship, health or some other tragedy, they are gripped with despair and life hardly seems worth living. Each persons grief is like a fingerprint - all react differently, but by drawing alongside, offering a listening ear, comfort, acceptance and prayer we can bring a flicker of hope back to their lives. This one day seminar helps us do this by considering such topics as: Suffering in Scripture, Trauma/Grief and it's possible effects on the body, How to impart Hope, Do's and Don'ts in showing care, How to listen. We too are engaged in the same mission as Jesus: to seek and to save the lost. To be a follower of Christ automatically leads to 'Fishing', the 2 are inseparable. How to share both Biblically and appropriately was the aim of the day.

EDGE is a growing youth ministry, based at Roomfield Baptist Church in Todmorden, West Yorkshire. The team have a passion for giving local teenagers a chance in life, someone to talk to and a safe place to go.

There's no such thing as a typical night at EDGE, but everything fits into one of the 4 main streams:

EDGE//Chill – Every Thursday we take over the church building, set up the Wii and PS3, pool table, sofas and stick the kettle on. Open from 7.30-10pm, on average 20-30 teenagers will pop in to say hi and have a brew.

EDGE//Chat – pretty fluid, but the youth team are available at any time (within reason!) to chat through problems with the youth. EDGE is not just for Thursday nights (or Christmas!) – the team believe strongly in building relationships and being mentors as and when needed.

EDGE//Church – held once a month, EDGE//Church is a chilled out worship service, top and tailed with pizza and coffee! It's relaxed, interactive and gives space for those awkward God questions to be asked.

EDGE//Challenge — quite literally, if it involves adrenalin we're up for it! Most of the team have proper grown-up qualifications allowing us to access things like the amazing local climbing spots. Sports nights on the local park are a regular event when the temperamental weather holds.

In the past EDGE have also held club nights, events for the Business Association, and are about to start working with other local organisations to look into providing a more holistic approach to youth work in the town. The MOST important thing is that there is something for the teenagers to do every night, not who does it – so we're hopeful for the way things might move forward. After nearly two years of prayer, planning and perseverance **Hitchin Street Angels** was launched on Saturday 30th April 2011. Volunteers will be active between 9.30pm and 2am every Saturday, come rain or shine. Part of the UK wide 'Street Angels' project Hitchin Street Angels is the church on the street, working in partnership with a wide range of agencies including: Police, District Council, Town Centre Management, Community and Voluntary groups, Town Centre Rangers and PubWatch.

At the centre of all that we do is our mission statement: "Hitchin Street Angels will provide an on-street facility and integrated safety net service for individuals in need. The needs of these individuals may be the result of homelessness in its various forms, intoxication, substance abuse and/or any other issue, which has caused personal distress or has the potential to cause physical harm to themselves or others."

Street Angels is an initiative of Churches Together in Hitchin and aim to show the Love and Care of the Christian Community to those who use Hitchin town centre. In addition to non-judgemental care, support and understanding, the service offers basic refreshments, basic first aid, and, where applicable, referral to appropriate services including Police, Night Shelter, medical, transport, counselling and accommodation facilities and personnel.



And finally, a flavour of our activities taken from our end of shift reports over the past four weeks:

We collected glass bottles, both broken and whole from the streets and

deposited them in bins with one group being mistaken for a CSI forensic team.

God gave one of the teams an opportunity to pray for a young man who was upset. There was also a commotion outside one of the clubs late into the evening and God led a team into the area to observe and pray into the situation and the Street Angels convinced some girls to make their way home, which they did, therefore keeping them safe from harm.

We found a girl with her boyfriend in a doorway and she couldn't walk as her heels were too high, so we gave her some flip flops to get her home and she was really grateful.

We saw two girls in a fight with each other. We spent over half an hour with them and one of them went home. The remaining girl was vulnerable and in a distressed state. We heard her story and gave her flip-flops and a space blanket. We waited with her until a taxi arrived to take her home.

Young girl from Luton approached us and needed a taxi. We walked with her to the taxi rank. The driver said £25 to Luton. With the girl only having £20 we persuaded the driver to take her for £20. The taxi driver made a point of stopping by us later in the evening to inform us the girl was home safe and sound. We thanked him for helping her and us.




During our weekend we met with team leader John and he give us all a tour of the city telling us about the different places were Nightlight work. The highlight of the weekend
